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**EFFECTIVE:** January 17, 2022



## **POSITIVE TEST RESULTS:**

These guidelines are for ALL positive cases regardless of vaccination status.

- The onset of symptoms or date of positive test is day zero.
- Isolate for five additional days and return to school/work if symptom free (24 + hours symptom/fever free
  without fever reducer). If returning, you must wear a well-fitted mask for an additional 5 days and eat
  lunch isolated away from others.

## **HOUSEHOLD CONTACTS**:

If someone in your household tests positive, the following guidelines must be followed.

- Vaccinated & Boosted (2 full weeks after last shot)
  - ( ) Wear mask for fifteen days
  - ( ) Recommend to test at day 5 and day 10 from exposure
- Documented COVID 19 with the school district (or medical printout) within the last 90 days
- Unvaccinated (Including Vaccinated but Not Boosted)-
  - ( ) Isolate for 5 days
  - ( ) Quarantine for another 5 days
  - ( ) An additional 5 days of mask wearing (15 days). This includes all activities and a lunch iso.
- Symptomatic- if you become symptomatic you must quarantine and test.

## **CLOSE CONTACTS:**

A close contact is defined as any person who was near a positive case unmasked for 15+ minutes within 48 hours of the onset of symptoms or the test date of a positive case.

- Vaccinated & Boosted (2 full weeks after last shot, including booster)
  - ( ) Wear mask for ten days
  - ( ) Recommend to test after day 5 from exposure
- Documented COVID 19 with the school district (or medical printout) within the last 90 days
  - ( ) Wear mask for ten days
  - ( ) Recommend to test after day 5 from exposure
- Unvaccinated -
  - ( ) Quarantine for 5 days < return day 6 if symptom free>
  - ( ) Recommend to test after day 5 from exposure
  - ( ) Wear properly fitting mask for an additional 5 days
  - ( ) Eat in isolation for the 5 days that the mask wearing is required
- **Symptomatic-** if you become symptomatic you must quarantine and test.

This is a very fluid pandemic and our guidelines based on the recommendation of the Pennsylvania Department of Health are subject to change.
